LEADERS GUIDE

Dear Leader,

You have accepted the awesome privilege and responsibility of guiding others on their journey through Exodus 33. Never forget that your most important role will be to model the way of the God Seeker. If you are truly seeking Him with your whole heart not only will you find Him, but others will be encouraged to seek and find Him as they observe your life.

This Leader's Guide is a tool to help you in that process, but it is in no way a substitute for your own tent time. As you prepare your heart in His presence and listen for His voice, He will reveal to you personally and uniquely how to facilitate your group. Use this Leader's Guide, but rely on your Lord.

Suggested Weekly Practices:

1) Prayer:

- Begin and end with prayer. Be brief and to the point with your opening prayer. This will help turn hearts and minds to the study at hand. Model that prayer is simply conversing with the Father. Any child can do it. It does not require important, correct or well thought out words. When you pray humbly from your heart as the leader, others will follow your example.
- You may want to ask a volunteer to open in prayer. Unless you know the person very well, consider asking in advance of small group time so they won't be caught off guard.
- End your study time each week with an extended prayer focus (10- 15 minutes). This should include a variety of prayer exercises so that both seasoned and rookie pray-ers can join in. Start out with the basics and move to deeper prayer opportunities as the weeks of study progress.

Some Prayer Methods You May want to Use:

- ✓ Fill in the blank prayer: using a white board or piece of paper, write out a simple prayer leaving a blank for each person to personalize. For example: "Dear Lord, I pray that you will help me seek you this week with all my heart and keep me from _____ as I go to my tent of meeting. (distractions, discouragement, falling asleep!) Give each person the opportunity to pray this prayer aloud.

- ✓ Squeeze-a-hand-prayer: Join hands in a circle. Encourage each person to pray a sentence prayer aloud as you move around the circle from a starting point L to R. If someone is not ready to pray aloud, they can squeeze the hand of the person next to them and it will pass on to the next person. As the leader, you may want to start the prayer circle.
- ✓ Partners: break the group into partners and encourage them to pray aloud for one specific request that their partner shares with them.
- ✓ Small groups: Depending on the size of your study group, you can break them down into even smaller groups of three or four and have them spend time in prayer together.
- ✓ Worship and prayer: Plan ahead to play a particular worship song quietly in the background and invite silent prayer as it plays.
- ✓ Posture: Try varying your posture during prayer time – ask everyone to kneel by their chair.
- ✓ Scripture prayer: Choose one particular Scripture from the day's lesson (or have each person choose their own). Invite them to turn that verse into a prayer, inserting their name at key points. You may need to model how this is done. Pray these verses aloud together.
- ✓ Popcorn prayer: Invite participants to “pop in” and “pop out” of prayer by inviting them to pray short, sentence prayers aloud as often as they like during this time of group prayer.
- ✓ Praise prayers: Set aside one week just for praise. No requests. Don't ask God for anything, but encourage your group to praise Him aloud for anything that comes to mind from this study or beyond!
- ✓ God Can prayers: Provide a container (dressing up a large tin can works great), 3x5 cards and pens. Invite participants to jot down a silent prayer request that needs God's attention. Place them in the God Can. These are for no one's eyes but the Lord's. As the weeks pass, pray as a group and as individuals over these silent requests remembering that when nothing else can help, God Can! On the last week of study you may want to invite anyone having experienced an answer or some movement on their God Can request to share it with the group if they are willing.

2) Scripture Reading/ Memory

- Read God's Word out loud. Each week highlight at least a few verses from the week's study. As you run across them in your discussion time, ask a volunteer to read them aloud for the group's benefit.
- Remember, it's God's Word (not the author of this study, not yours and not your group members) that is living and active, sharper than any double-edged sword, piercing even

to the diving of soul and spirit and of joints and marrow and able to judge both the thoughts and intentions of the heart (Hebrews 4:12). Keep the focus on God's Word!

- Consider allowing one or more participants who are willing to recite last week's memory verse to do so aloud. Or, you could read it out loud together as a group. You could also spend a couple of minutes practicing the suggested memory verse each week.

3) Discussion

- You will notice below that your first week of group time has been divided into suggested increments showing you how much time to spend on each question. This is based on an hour time allotment with 40 minutes of discussion and 10-15 minutes of prayer time. *This is only an example! Your group size and the time you have available will influence what you do and the way you do it. Plan ahead for good time management, but be led by the Spirit.*
- As well, the highlighted questions are merely suggestions. You may be led to emphasize different points according to the needs of your group.
- Along with the suggested questions for discussion, you will also want to call attention to some of the thoughts/quotes that stood out to you and to your group members from the study itself.

Chapter 1: God Seekers Accept the Invitation to Seek God

Key Theme: Almighty God is inviting you to seek Him with your whole heart. How will you respond?

Key Verse: Jeremiah 29:13 "If you seek Me, you will find Me, if you seek Me with all your heart."

Key Points to Cover:

Day 1- Seeker's Dilemma – I have to seek God if I want to find Him.

1. Read Jeremiah 29:13 out loud (1 min.)
2. Page 7, Last question, "Why do you think God wants you to seek Him . . ." (5 min.)

Day 2- Seeker's Surprise- God is eager for me to find Him.

1. Page 8, First question, "Look up Exodus 3:13-14 . . ." (*The name I AM teaches us that God is a present tense God. He is available today just as He was in Bible times.) (1 min.)

2. Page 8, Second question, "How does it make you feel to know that God longs to be found by you . . ." (3 min.)
3. Page 10, Second question, "Jeremiah 29:13 tells us . . ." (1 min.)
4. Page 11, Third question, "What is currently hindering you . . ." (5 min.)
5. Page 13, Combine First and Second questions: Read John 16:33; "How do you respond to the truth that seeking God will not protect your heart . . ." (5 min.)

Day 3- The Seeker's Part- I have to seek Him personally. No one can choose for me.

1. Page 16, Questions 1-4 (5 min.)

Day 4- The Seeker's Reality- Life is full of distractions that can hinder my God Seeking.

1. Page 18, Combine third and fourth questions, "What effect do your duties have . . . and how do you plan to be on guard . . ." (5 min.)

Day 5- The Seeker's Declaration- I will do what it takes to seek God with my whole heart.

1. Page 19, First question, "What is Moses doing?" (1 min.)
2. Page 19, Second question, "Who was invited . . ." (1 min.)
3. Page 20, First question, "What keeps people from responding to God's invitation . . ." (5 min.)
4. Page 21; Invite anyone who is willing to share their personal declaration. (3 min.)

Chapter 2: God Seekers Have a Place to Meet with God

Key Theme: Having a separate, private place set aside for the purpose of meeting with God will help you seek Him and find Him.

Key Verse: Matthew 6:6a "Go into your room, close the door and pray to your Father . . ."

Key Points to Cover:

Day 1- Location, Location, Location – You are a Tent of Meeting. You house God's Holy Spirit!

1. Page 22, First question, Where did the idea for having a specific place to seek God originate?

2. Page 22, Third question, What is the name of the place where God Seekers met with God?
3. Page 23, Third question, Where does the Spirit of God live now?
4. Page 23, Fourth question, What makes it possible for God's Spirit to live in you?

Day 2- In You, Through You- God lives not only in you, but through you.

1. Page 25, What benefits do you enjoy as a child of God with His Spirit inside of you?
2. Page 25, Last question – Page 26 top half, How should this affect the way you live every day?
3. Page 26, middle paragraph, How do you react to the statement “. . . as a New Testament believer in Christ you don't go to church to find the presence of God. You bring the presence of God with you.”

Day 3- A Separate Place- Creating a separate place to meet with God can help you hear from Him.

1. Page 28, First question, Do you have a Tent of Meeting or any ideas for creating one?
2. Page 29, Second question, Why did Moses pitch the Tent so far from camp?
3. Page 30, 2nd to last paragraph, Interact with the quote from Richard Foster. Is this true? For you? For our society?
4. Page 31, last two questions, How do you handle solitude: 1) in general, 2) when it's for seeking God?

Day 4- A Private Place- Having a private place to seek God increases the intimacy in your relationship with Him.

Day 5- A Clear Purpose- Do you have a place set aside only for seeking God?

2. Page 35, First question, Who could be impacted by your time in the Tent?

3. Page 35, Last question, What do you want to see God do or change in you as you spend time in your Tent?

Chapter 3: God Seekers Establish a Pattern of Meeting with God

Key Theme: There's power in regularly meeting with God, but developing the habit will require effort.

Key Verse: Exodus 33:7b NASB "Everyone who sought the Lord would go out to the tent."

Key Points to Cover:

Day 1- Effort – Establishing a routine of seeking God won't happen by chance!

1. Page 37, Have you ever pitched an old fashioned tent?
2. Page 38 Last question -- 39 top, What are some of the specific efforts involved in seeking God?
3. Page 39, First question, What part will be most difficult for you?

Day 2- Leave it Behind- Seeking God must become a priority over other things.

1. Page 40, First question, What did Moses leave behind to seek God?
2. Page 41, Last question, What will you have to leave behind?
3. Page 42, How do you feel about getting up early to seek God? Have you ever tried this?
4. Page 43, First question, What do you learn about your enemy in Revelation?

Day 3- Persistence- Don't give up! Seeking God is a process.

1. Page 45, Last question, What do Isaiah and Peter reveal about God's timing?
2. Page 47, Middle paragraph, Are you ever tempted to "take over" for God when He seems to be moving too slowly for you?
3. Page 47, Third question, How did the Israelites do this in Ex. 32:1-4?
4. Page 48, Second question, How is God a reward for those who seek Him?

Day 4- Making Time- We'll never *find* time for God. We must *make* time for Him.

Key Verse: Psalm 119:10a "I seek You with all my heart."

Key Points to Cover:

Day 2- Crowd-leavers- God Seekers step out from the crowd.
